

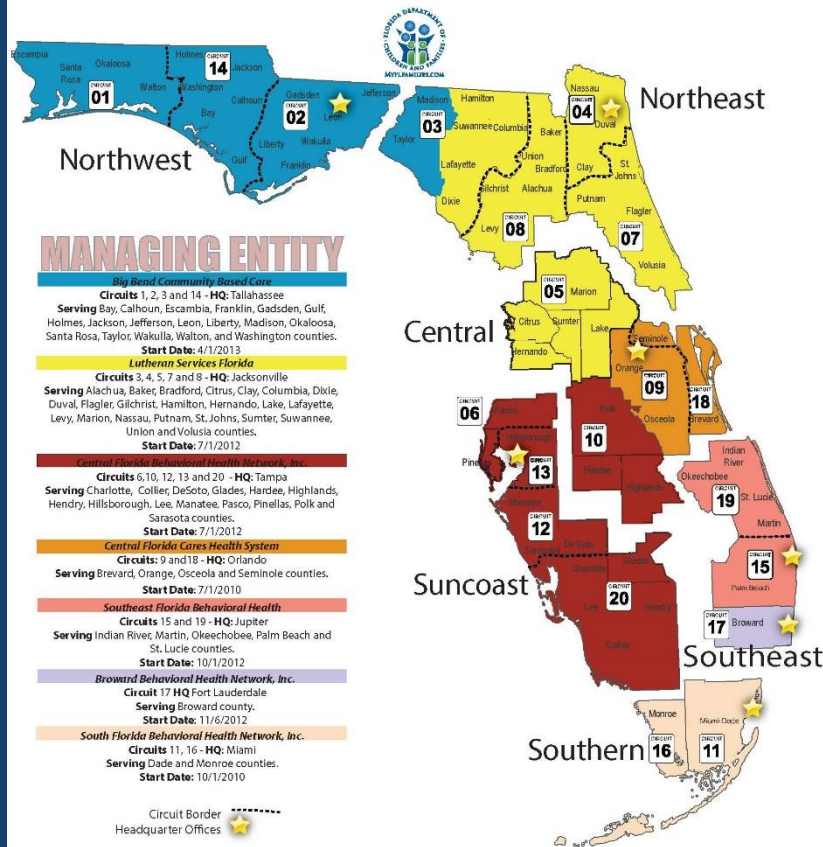

Governor DeSantis Legislation Funding

This fiscal year more funding to support Florida's fight against opioids:



- \$26m Federal funding
- \$3m Road to Recovery (Care Coordination , Transition vouchers , Inpatient Detoxification, Residential Treatment, Case Management, Recovery Support, Prevention, Medication Assisted Treatment)
- Re-establish the Office of Drug Control
- Statewide Task Force on Opioid Drug Abuse
- Award of National Health Emergency Dislocated Workers (up-to \$2,500,000, with \$833,333 released initially)

Opioid Stats



- 250 million prescriptions for opioid in 2012 – enough for every adult in America to have a bottle of pills (Surgeon General)
- The US makes up less than 5% of the world's population, yet uses 81% of the opioid supplies.
- Almost 1/3 of all Medicare patients – nearly 12 million – were prescribed opioid painkillers in 2015. That same year 2.7 million over age 50 abused painkillers. Meaning took them for reason not originally prescribed.

American Action Forum Study



- 1999-2015 there were 4.1 million fewer people in the workforce because of opioid addiction.
- 25-54 loss of employees and their productivity costs the US economy \$702.1 billion, or just under \$44 billion per year.
- Nearly 1 million in their prime earning years were absent from workforce in 2015.
- 42,000 people in 2016 died (CDC).
- 20% men/25% women decline in workforce participation
- 5.7 men/6.4 billion women work hours Lost 1999 - 2015

Combating the Opioid Epidemic



Education and Awareness

- Increase awareness through prevention and education (health care professionals, schools, PSAs, pregnant women, etc.).
- Reduce deaths and overdoses by increasing the availability of life saving treatment to dependent person and their families (e.i. MAT services, NARCAN, etc.).
- Connecting persons in needs of services.
- Decrease access to opioids by establishing community strategies (such as identifying and targeting hot spots, charging suppliers with 1st degree murder, etc.).
- Information sharing (such as PDMP, LEA-LEA, Service Agencies-Service Agencies, etc.).

Medication Assisted Treatment



“One size fits all” approach to opioid addiction treatment **does not work**. Some people may benefit from medication assisted treatment and counseling for varying lengths of time, including lifelong treatment. Opioid addiction in some instances requires care management for effective treatment. Treatment methods that help patients stabilize, achieve remission of symptoms, and establish and maintain recovery.

Medication Assisted Treatment



Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) is an evidenced based treatment program which includes a full biopsychosocial approach to treating substance abuse. This comprehensive approach to treatment incorporates medical, psychiatric, and behavioral health care to those addicted to opiates.

Medication Assisted Treatment



May include any of the following:

- Methadone, buprenorphine (Suboxone), Naltrexone (Vivitrol), and others that may assist recovery.
- Nalxone (Narcan) a shorting acting medication to reverse an opioid overdose if administered in time.
- Psychiatric overlay services
- Medical Services
- Assessments, biopsychosocial evaluations
- Individual and group psychotherapy
- Individual and group counseling to trauma, depression, anxiety, etc.

Medication Assisted Treatment



May include any of the following:

- Detoxification (Detox)
- Assessment
- Case Management Services
- Outreach /Educational
- Peer Support Outreach
- Recovery Support Services
- Residential
- Inpatient/Outpatient Services

What are the Warning Signs?



Call 911 immediately if a person exhibits any of these symptoms:

- Inability to think, talk, or walk normally
- Extremely pale and/or feels clammy to the touch
- Body goes limp or weakness
- Fingernails or lips have a purple or blue color
- Vomiting or making gurgling noises
- Cannot be awakened or are unable to speak
- Trouble breathing or shallow breaths
- Heartbeat slows or stops

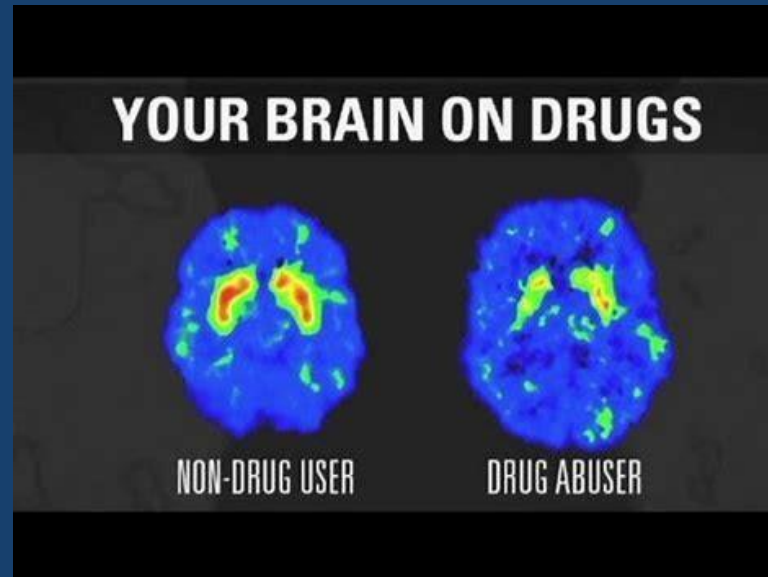

Good Samaritan Law



40 states (Florida being one) have enacted some form of a **GOOD SAMARITAN LAW** or **911 DRUG IMMUNITY LAW**. These laws generally provide immunity from arrest, charge or prosecution for certain controlled substance possession and paraphernalia offenses when a person who is either experiencing an opiate-related overdose or observing one calls 911 for assistance or seeks medical attention.
